Introduction to Crime Scene Investigation was developed for new crime scene investigators and law enforcement first responders, with step-by-step introduction to scene processing and evidence collection. Topics covered include: physical evidence, crime scene documentation, biological material, trace evidence, latent prints, footwear/tire tracks, tools and toolmarks, and firearms.

Intermediate Crime Scene Investigation goes beyond basic skills to cover situations investigators don't see every day and provides expanded skills and knowledge for investigators, students interested in pursuing forensic science, corrections agencies, death investigators, and tribal agencies. New techniques include casting footprints under water, lifting fingerprints from skin, bloodstain documentation and includes do-ityourself experiment ideas to help students or agency teams practice new skills. Cost: \$129

Photography presents the critical knowledge and skills needed to capture fair and accurate photographic documentation of any scene. This 6-hour course covers digital camera basics, lighting strategies, and methods to capture images of impression evidence and bloodstains. Learn to 'paint with light,' capture a drop of water in motion, and prepare for courtroom testimony.
